I will also try to post a discussion question or two to entice you to attend – but attendance is not required and will not be recorded.

Your final grade will be based on three components: two take-home essay exams -- you will have a 24-hour period to complete each exam after I post the questions on Canvas (anyone needing an adjusted or extended time period can contact me and we will talk). Also, I want each of you to write a short, roughly 400-word mini-research essay on a current topic of your choosing related in some way to the study of dinosaurs. I will give you more information on each of these three assignments as the quarter proceeds.

Our persistence, determination, and flexibility are all being tested daily over these many months now, and I am proud of you all for keeping at it!
